

## The Chicago Temple Basic Facts

Architects: Holabird & Roche

• Consulting engineer: Henry J. Burt

Construction company: John Griffiths & Son
 Construction supervisor: Frederick J. Thielbar

• Original site dimensions: 132 feet (Clark Street frontage) by 80 feet (Washington Street frontage)

• Additions to site: 21 to 27 Clark Street (50 feet by 80 feet) purchased from estate of David A. Kohn and leasehold from Harry C. Moir

• **Temple dimensions**: 182 feet (Clark Street) by 80 feet (Washington Street)

• Construction material: Indiana limestone; Bedford stone (lobby and vestibule); Batesville and Belgian Black Marble (entry floors)

• Foundation: concrete piles (caissons) resting on bedrock (38 on bedrock, 5 on hardpan)

• Caisson average depth: 115 feet

• Caisson diameter: from five feet to eight feet, four inches

• Structural framework: steel with terra cotta tile arch floors and roof

• Exterior walls: Bedford limestone backed with brick

• Tower: some steel framing, but mostly a gravity structure of masonry covered with Bedford stone

Spire: light steel framework covered with reinforced concrete

• Number of stories: 22 (highest floor available for rental: 21)

Building height: 260 feet
Tower height: 140 feet
Spire height: 156 feet

• Cross: 12 feet high, 6 feet wide, made of bronze, plated with copper, covered in gold leaf, and weighs 250 pounds

• Sanctuary walls: Heavily paneled in quarter sawed red (some sources say white) oak

• Sanctuary capacity (as originally designed): 800 on first floor, 400 in balcony (sources vary)

• Construction loan underwriter: Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company (Milwaukee, WI)

Total value of building and property when opened: \$5,000,000
